I am excited to announce the start of our Ohio Senior Health Insurance Information Program's (OSHIIP) annual statewide Medicare Checkup events.

These free events have virtual and in-person attendance options and are a tremendous opportunity for the nearly 2.5 million Ohioans on Medicare to get unbiased help sorting out health insurance coverage that will best suit their needs for next year. Medicare open enrollment runs October 15 through December 7.

The events cover Medicare basics, plan comparisons, prescription drug coverage, financial assistance, and cost-saving tips. Prior to October 15, the focus is on educational sessions. Once open enrollment begins, OSHIIP's Medicare experts provide personalized plan comparisons and one-on-one counseling.

Lorraine Carli, Public Affairs Office According to the latest "Smoke Alarms in the U.S." report from the National Fire Protection Association® (NFPA®), working smoke alarms reduce the risk of dying in a home fire by more than half (60 percent), while the majority of civilian home fire deaths continues to occur in homes with no smoke alarms or no working alarms. These statistics coupled with newly released findings from a comprehensive U.S.

Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) survey reinforce the critical importance of Fire Prevention Week<sup>™</sup>, October 6–12, and this year's theme, "Smoke alarms: Make them work for you!™"

"Smoke alarms can make a life-saving difference in a home fire, but they have to be working in order to protect people," said Lorraine Carli, vice president of Outreach and Advocacy at NFPA. "This year's
